This summer, in conjunction with Responsible Recycling Services (RRS), the Borough will host two Electronics Recycling Days – July 20 and September 7, from 9:00 a.m. until 12 noon, on Railroad Street in front of the Train Station. EAST MAIN STREET WATER MAIN PROJECT RESURFACING NOTICE

The East Main Street Water Main Project is planned for this summer and resurfacing is estimated to be done in 2015.

Work will be performed from 43 W. Main Street to 50 W. Main Street (Constitution Boulevard to the bridge next to Turkey Hill), and from 10 E. Main Street to 15254 Kutztown Road (the bridge next to Turkey Hill to Weis Plaza Shopping Center).

The Borough wishes to encourage all residents and property owners, who plan to have gas service installed at their properties, to have it done prior to the start of resurfacing to avoid pave cutting the fresh pavement.

Please be advised that the Borough is considering implementing a fee to have a pave cut done after the street is resurfaced.

Bicentennial Celebration Kicks off with Annual "Brew and Que" Event



Kutztown will celebrate the 200th anniversary of its incorporation as a Borough in 2015, and planning for the week-long event is already underway. The celebration is set to begin on July 25, 2015, with the annual Muscle on Main event organized by the Kutztown Community Partnership. The Bicentennial Committee has several different events scheduled to be held throughout the week – such as a parade, ice cream social and movie night – culminating in the well known Kutztown Day celebration on Sunday, August 2, 2015.

In order for this event to be a success, fundraising has already begun for the 200th anniversary. There will be an annual "Brew and Que" event at the new Saucony Creek Brewing Company to raise funds for the 2015 celebration. The event will consist of a 50/50 quoits tournament, live music, beer sampling, pig roast, auction and other backyard BBQ activities. Teen Programs for students who have completed 6th grade and up will be held at 6:00 p.m. on the following dates: June 18, July 16 and August 13.


Summer Reading Finale Program

Environmental Advisory Commission

The Environmental Advisory Commission (EAC) is a group of community members, appointed by Borough Council, to advise about the protection, conservation, management, promotion and use of natural resources within the Borough. Much of this is done through educational community workshops.

On April 27, EAC held its first Rain Barrel Workshop, with 20 participants each learning about the importance of water conservation and taking home a rain barrel. EAC also donated a rain barrel, which was painted by a group of students, to the school garden.

EAC recently had the help of several groups in cleaning up along the Sacony Creek Trail. The Sigma Alpha Epsilon fraternity and a large group of students from the Kutztown Middle School, led by sixth grade science teacher Matt Esser, assisted in cleaning up trash. Additionally, a Kutztown University environmental biology class removed four truckloads of invasive shrubs from along one portion of the trail.

Water Department Wins Prestigious Award

On April 11, 2013, Borough representatives attended the Pennsylvania Rural Water Association conference, where they were presented with an Area-Wide Optimization Program Award. The Borough received this award in 2007 as well.

The award, given by the United States Environmental Protection Agency and the Pennsylvania Department of Environmental Protection, was presented for the Borough's efforts in optimizing water turbidity (the level of clearness and cleanliness of drinking water).

Over 200 water filtration plants submitted data for consideration

Public Emergency Notification by Phone and Siren

A Public Notification System was adopted by the Borough in 2009. It is free to every Borough household, but you must be registered to receive this service.

To register, please visit the Borough's Web site, www.kutztownboro.org, and click the "SWIFT 911 Notification" link or fill out a form that can be obtained from the Kutztown Municipal Building located at 45 Railroad Street. The information that you provide will only be used for the Borough's Public Notification System. It will not be shared with anyone else.

Facts about the System:

- The system operates 24/7.
- · Notification is made to you by phone, E-mail or both.
- Notifications are made only for major concerns. Examples include flooding and other natural disaster information, water shut-offs, and other incidents which would require immediate attention by residents.
- This system is not abused by notifications for minor concerns or incidents, and discretion is used as to the timing of notifications.
- SwiftReach is an automated system that is controlled by the Borough's Information Technology Department. It can reach every Borough household with a recorded message within five minutes, and it can also be tailored to reach designated smaller areas, if needed. Follow-up calls are made if the initial call goes unanswered.

Emergency Alert Siren

In addition, the Borough has an Emergency Alert Siren that is tested every three months at noon on the first Friday of February, May, August and November. The siren is an asset for people outside of the home or office.
